

Yale H. Ferguson is Professorial Fellow, Division of Global Affairs, Rutgers University-Newark and Honorary Professor, University of Salzburg. He is also Emeritus Professor of Global and International Affairs, Rutgers University. The DGA Professorial Fellow role means that he continues to supervise Ph.D. students and returns to lecture from time to time. He and his wife now divide their time between residences in South Carolina and Cambridge, England.

Ferguson received his Ph.D. at Columbia University in 1966 and joined the Rutgers-Newark faculty in 1966. From 1998-2008 he was Professor II, Rutgers's equivalent of distinguished professor. Over the years he taught a variety of graduate and undergraduate courses related to his specialty in Global Politics and served several terms as Chair and Graduate Director of the Department of Political Science. In the mid-1990s, he was one of the founders of the Center for Global Change and Governance, which later became the Division of Global Affairs. He was Co-Director of the DGA from 2002-2008.

Ferguson's publications include 11 books and over 50 journal articles and book chapters. He is editor of *Contemporary Inter-American Relations* (1972), and co-editor of *Continuing Issues in International Politics* (1973) with Walter F. Weiker, and *Political Space: Frontiers of Change and Governance in a Globalizing World* (2002) with R.J. Barry Jones. In addition, Ferguson has maintained a decades-long intellectual collaboration with Richard W. Mansbach at Iowa State University. Their co-authored books to date are:

Ferguson and Mansbach are continuing to write together. They recently completed two essays for the *International Studies Compendium Project* on "Postinternational Politics" and "The Sociology of the State." They also have two major research projects in progress: *Changing Patterns of Globalization*; and *Preinternational Politics: The Ancient Mediterranean*.

Ferguson currently serves on the editorial advisory boards of *International Studies Review*, *Global Governance*, and the *Sage Encyclopedia of Global Studies* and on the international advisory board of research programs in globalization and governance at the University of Lund (TransDemos) and the One-Dot Center in Taiwan. Past editorial advisory board memberships include *International Studies Quarterly* (1999-2003) and the international advisory board of *European Journal of International Relations* (1995-2000).

Honors bestowed upon Ferguson include the Lynne Rienner/Quincy Wright Award, International Studies Association-Midwest (1996); Rutgers University Board of Trustees

Award for Excellence in Research (1999); Honorary Professor at the University of Salzburg (Austria) (2002-); and membership into the European Academy of Sciences and Arts (2005-). He has been Visiting Fellow at both Clare Hall (1986-87) and the Centre of International Studies (1986-87, 1991, 2008) at the University of Cambridge. He was made a Life Member of Clare Hall in 1987. He was also Fulbright Professor at the University of Salzburg (1992-93), Senior Fellow at the Norwegian Nobel Institute in Oslo, Norway (1996), Visiting Professor at the University of Salzburg (2001, 2005), and Visiting Scholar at the University of Padova (Italy) (2001).
